A staff luncheon on February 24<sup>th</sup> was followed by a "Come and Go" farewell tea for Ashley Dufault. Ashley worked as our Summer Student and Assistant Library Clerk for over four years. She was accepted to the Criti Care EMS Paramedic Academy; and we are proud to say, has since graduated.

February was "I Love to Read Month," and each visit to the Library entitled patrons and visitors to an entry for one of our book draws. Lucky winners were: Ivy Pluchinsky, Keith Gladstone, Stephanie Golka, Gudrun Eibisch, Jennifer Pinto, Isabelle Fontaine, Janice Halliday and Jack Halliday.

Sport, Culture and Heritage Minister Rochelle Squires launched a program and policy review of public library service in February 2017. Libraries across Manitoba received a consultation package, consisting of an Environmental Scan and a Comprehensive Survey. Seven Policy and Program Review Forums were held at various Manitoba locations; with Cathie Brereton (Board Secretary) and Vickie Short (Head Librarian) attending the forum hosted by the Jake Epp Library in Steinbach.

The Library hosted "**Spring into the Library**" during Spring Break. Local and visiting children joined us for "Puppet Fun," "Wool Carding" and "All about Easter" as well as stories, crafts and refreshments (see Appendix).

The Lac du Bonnet Regional Library and the Winnipeg River Arts Council co-hosted our 5<sup>th</sup> Annual "Celebrating Stories" on April 20<sup>th</sup>. Our special guests for that evening were Artist/Storyteller Mary Louise Chown; Singer/Songwriter Shawn Keith; and representing the Lac du Bonnet & District Historical Society, Karen David (see Special Events and Appendix).

Our **Annual Spring Tea** for Volunteers and Library Friends was held May 5<sup>th</sup>. We hope the 27 guests enjoyed the event as much as we enjoyed showing our heartfelt appreciation for all they do for us. Volunteers, patrons and friends joined Library Board Members and Staff for an enjoyable afternoon (see Appendix).



Local student and library patron Lily Hodgson was awarded second-prize for her entry in the 2016 Polar Expressions Publishing writing contest for Canadians. Winning entries (ages 5 to 15) were published in *Dreamtastic: A New Collection of Poetry and Short Stories Written by Young Canadians.*" Lily kindly donated a copy to our Library (see Appendix).

In June, our volunteers "came to the rescue" once again by working at Mrs. Lucci's, earning the Library \$500.00. In addition, we received \$1,000.00 from Lucci's Too – a very timely and welcome donation to offset the cost of a combination printer/scanner/copier to replace the printer and the copier that could no longer be repaired. Cathie Brereton and Vickie Short accepted the donation on behalf of the Library (see Appendix).

The Interlake Eastern Suicide Prevention Committee's mission is to support initiatives that are designed to prevent the occurrence of suicide by promoting mental well-being and encouraging help-seeking behaviours through awareness and education activities/resources. This Committee graciously donated several books to our Library.

The **Summer Reading Program** ran from July 4<sup>th</sup> to August 17<sup>th</sup>. This year the program theme was "Celebrating Canada's 150<sup>th</sup>." Emily Massingham was hired as the Summer Reading Program Coordinator (see Special Events).

Our **Annual Fall Supper** was held on September 16<sup>th</sup> at the Legion Hall. Royal Canadian Legion Branch #164 generously donated the Hall and our Legion comrades and the Ladies Auxiliary prepared the meal for almost 400 guests (see Special Events).

September 17<sup>th</sup> was designated Manitoba Open Farm Day. Free bookmarks and brochures, complete with maps and information on participating farms were made available at the Library.

Lac du Bonnet Library hosted "Pyjama Storytime" on November 16<sup>th</sup> (see Special Events and Appendix).

It was another successful year for the magazine sponsorship program. Library friends and local business sponsors are responsible for the existence of at least half our magazine collection.

The Library Boardroom continued to be used on a regular basis throughout the year. Local groups such as: the Lac du Bonnet Food Bank; Winnipeg River Arts Council; Winnipeg River Recreation Commission; and various students writing exams that require a Proctor.

Our appreciation is once again extended to the Town and RM of Lac du Bonnet for their continued support. The RM of Alexander continued to compensate the Library for services provided to their residents residing in the Bird River area. Total 2017 funding from the RM of Alexander was \$2,915.00.

Funding received from the Province, the RM and the Town amounted to \$96,478.25, for 2017. In addition, we received \$3,716.51 as our share of a Rural Library Technological Sustainability Grant; and from the Federal Government, a Canada Summer Jobs Student Grant of \$2,640.00 that assisted in funding the Summer Reading Program Coordinator position.

#### Training and Development...

- March 16<sup>th</sup>, Vickie and Janice participated in the RBDigital OneClick Audiobook training offered via webinar.
- Vickie, Janice, and Michelle received in-house training from a Bridgeport representative on the operation and maintenance of the newly-acquired printer/scanner/copier.
- The Eastman and Interlake Library Group continues to meet three times a year. Participating libraries take turns hosting the meetings. The libraries include: Lac du Bonnet, Pinawa, Beausejour, Allard, Selkirk, Stonewall, Springfield and Steinbach.

#### Special Events...

On January 26<sup>th</sup>, the Library hosted **Family Literacy Night** with puppets, stories, jokes and games! Sixteen children, parents, staff and volunteers had lots of fun with the puppet show led by volunteer Larissa Shabaga. Along with Larissa, we'd like to thank Janice Halliday, Melissa Miler, and Cathie and Rick Brereton for all their help throughout the evening. Lucky winners of the attendance draws were Saffiya R. and Bella T.





The evening was a success with the puppets teaching the value of reading!

From March 28<sup>th</sup> to March 30<sup>th</sup>, the Library hosted "**Spring into the Library**." Local and visiting children participated in the 3-day program with crafts, stories and more! The highlight of the program included the Lac du Bonnet & District Historical Society representative Skylor Mitchell demonstrating wool carding and helping the children make a "God's Eye".

The Library hosted the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual **Celebrating Stories** on April 20<sup>th</sup>, featuring Mary-Louise Chown, a story-teller in Australia, Great Britain and Canada. Mary-Louise brought her shamanic training and spoke vividly about Dr. Charlotte Ross. On behalf of the Lac du Bonnet & District Historical Society, Karen David told the story of her family emigration to Canada from Latvia. Local song writer Shawn Keith entertained the group with his original music and explained how he came to write the piece.




We concluded the Summer Program with a windup held at the Community Centre. Approximately 100 people attended the Prairie Exotics exhibit, with refreshments served at the Library after the event. A partnership between The Lac du Bonnet Library, The Lac du Bonnet Children's Centre, and The Winnipeg River Recreation District provided the funding for the windup.





We hold 830 copies in our magazine collection and 349 copies in our Back-Issue magazine collection. Approximately 1,770 items were withdrawn in 2017.

A visit to the Library does not always result in a check-out of material – some patrons come to browse or read magazines, and others find the information they need in our reference section or on the Internet. This is not reflected in our circulation statistics. Total sign-ins for the Public Access Computers for 2017 was 693 (WiFi users not included). The Early Literacy Station remains very popular with the young children. The Library website received 2,177 visits in 2017.

**Point of Interest:** Despite all efforts made by staff over the years to collect, as of December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2017, this Library is owed \$5,633.44 in unpaid fines.

The Lac du Bonnet Library, with the Lac du Bonnet and District Historical Society, will be hosting our fifth annual Celehrating Stories on Thursday, April 20 at 7 p.m. at the Library. Mary Louise Chown has been a storyteller in Australia, Great Britain, and Canada, and is also a trained artist who works in all mediums.

As part of the RM of Luc du Bonnet's 100th Birth-day Celebration, she will be sharing the historical tale of Dr. Charlotte Ross, who lived in the Eastman area in the 1800s and was the first female doctor in Manitoba.

Our featured singer/songwriter Shawn Keith was born in Niagara Falls, Ont. not that long ago and is now living in Lac du Bonnet. Shawn started playing piano and cello at an early age, leading him eventu-ally to guitar and song writing. He has recorded some of his original music, as well as electric blues covers of its original music, is well as execute these covers with The Whiting Dogs. Shawn has played with in-merous local musicians in clubs and feativitis around southeastern Manitoba and is currently a member of

scumeastern Manuton and is currently a microber of the multi-talented Dug Pound.

Representing the historical society will be Karen David, who will share the stury of how her great-grandparents all found relige in Cunada after fleeing the Baltic states during the Russian revolution. Lily Hodgson of Lac din Bonnet received some unexpected news recently after submitting a peem she wrote to the 9th annual Polar Expressions Publishing Contest for Young Writers. The local 12-year-old

The local 12-year-old won second place in the poetry division of the rational competition and her work has been published in a new book titled Dream-nessis, a collection of poems and short stories written by young Canadians.

"My morn got the e-mail and I was so surprised," said Lily, "I looked at the horiourable mentions first and didn't see my name, then checked for thord place, and I wasn't here either."

I wasn't there either."
The winning poem is called Sowething to Wait For, and Lily said that it was inspired by her family, her memories and basically verything in her life,

Every summer, Lily looks forward to gathering with her extended family in Riding Mountain National Park, an annual reason that has become a treasured family tradition. Lily's relatives travel from Saskatchewan, Ontario and communities in Mamitobe every year to spend this special time together.

"My family is really important to me; they help me move along with everything," said Lily. "I'm so glad we have this time every year because they're awesome!"

Lily was completing Grade 6 at Centennial School in Lac du Bonner last year when she started working on the poem during a class with her teacher Dave Ogren.

"My mom really liked it and said I should submir it for a contest she heard about at the library" she added.

Two years ago, Lily wrote a story on why adults should encourage kids to fish, and submitted it to the Brawpeg Free Praco. The article was published, and Lily earned her name as a writer at the tender age of 10.

"It did not surprise me even a little bit when she had an article published in the Winnipeg Free Press and it did not surprise me even a little bit when she told me that she had wen a poetry contest and her poem had heen selected to be published," said Ogreen. "When her first book is published one day, I won't be surprised. My overwhelming feelings are pride and a happiness that I got to play a small part in her life."

After completing grade 6 last June, she spent time over the summer working on the poem. When she was satisfied with the result, she submitted it to Polar Expressions for consideration.

In addition to the national accollades, Lify received a cash prize of \$100 for her second place win.

"Lily gave me a copy of the book that her poem was published in when it first came out and signed it for me," and Ogren. "That was an armazing gift. I'm so proud of her."
