With the easing of some Manitoba Public Health Orders, Summer Reading Club Coordinator Lily Hodgson and Events Coordinator Larissa Shabaga were thrilled to offer in-person meet-ups every Wednesday morning. During these meet-ups, registered children completed two crafts, played games, ate snacks, and enjoyed stories.



In order to make the Summer Reading Club accessible to everyone, all activities from the meetups were also available for pick up and detailed instructions and pictures for activities were posted on our website. Additionally, Lily hosted Zoom meetings every Thursday morning where she read stories and played games with the children virtually.

Like the previous year, *Weekly Reading Logs* were available on our website. Registered children kept track of how long they read every week for a chance to win one of six reading prizes. Children who handed in all their reading logs were dubbed "Super Readers" and were given a

certificate. For every 500 minutes the group read, a flower was added to the Summer Reading Club's display. In total the children read 20, 588 minutes, so there were a lot of flowers!



This year there was also a Grand Prize which children could earn entries for by attending the Summer Reading Club every week.

During the last week of Summer Reading Club, we tie dyed tee-shirts! On the last Wednesday of the program, kids chose one of two design techniques, bulls-eye or swirl, and then dyed their shirts. Each shirt featured a Lac du Bonnet Library Summer Reading Club logo.



The next day at the wind-up, the shirts were unraveled. Everyone's shirt turned out amazing!



For the wind-up, the Summer Reading Club met at Larissa's backyard. At the wind-up there were games, snacks, tie-dyed shirts were unraveled, and the winners for the prizes were announced. Best of all, in the end every kid got to go home with their very own book!



Overall, it was a fantastic summer filled with plenty of fun games, cool crafts, and great stories. *Family Literacy Day* takes place every January 27<sup>th</sup> to raise awareness about the importance of reading and engaging in literacy activities as a family. Held on January 23<sup>rd</sup>, 26 children joined us at the Library, along with their parents and grandparents. The children took over the library and had a great time reading books in the blanket forts they built with their family and friends!

Then the children had fun with shadows and played a variety of games, including Flashlight Pictureka, with Colter, Lily, Sophie and Auriane. Then, to finish off the evening, the children enjoyed a story time with Janice.





# LdB Library cancels fundraising supper

Vickie Short, head librarian at the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library, said their annual fall supper fundraiser has been cancelled

for the second consecutive year.

"The library board made the difficult decision at their July board meeting to cancel their 2021 fall supper. The uncertainty of their 2021 lan supper. The direct analysis the crowd sizes allowed indoors, and if the Legion would be open left them no choice but to cancel the dinner," explained Short.

Despite the fact all restrictions were

lifted Aug. 7 the cancellation remains intact due to the amount of time required to plan this event.

"We have to plan for this months in advance, with work bees for food prep and

items like the turkeys are ordered in the early summer," explained Short.

Short said the past 17 months have proven to be a strange and yet uplifting time for the library staff.

"As of May 11, we were once again

only able to allow curb side service for our patrons, and are fortunate to have many embrace this service," said Short.

She noted this was the third time the

library had to close its doors since March 2020

On July 17 the Province of Manitoba lifted the restrictions from public librar-ies and Short said she fully expected their

digital eBook statistics to increase, but was surprised this was not the case.

"People still want to hold a book in their hands, and this was evident by the pure joy on people's faces when we re-opened. The library continues to be a crucial service for our community," said Short.

Library programming has taken on a new twist with their Summer Reading Club that meets twice a week. Short said the Wednesday sessions have been held outside and Thursday sessions were conducted via

"We unfortunately had to cap our out-door day at 24, but anyone is able to join us virtually on Thursdays. The kids are piling up the hours on their reading logs and are excited to enter in for our summer reading prizes," said Short.

The annual fall supper is the main fund-

raiser for the library and although the Town and RM continue to support the facility, the Province of Manitoba continues to hold its per capita levy at \$8.50. "This level was set in place in 2004," said

Short. "Seventeen years is quite a drought without an increase, thus the library is forced to fundraise to balance their budget."

In 2019, the annual fall supper netted \$5,900. Despite last year's cancellation, Short said they were fortunate community members and friends of the library stepped up with just over \$7,600 in donations.

Short hopes the donations for 2021 will be as generous and reminds the public charitable tax receipts will be issued for

contributions by cash, cheques, e-transfers, debit or credit cards

# Searching for great young Canadian writers

Staff members of the Lac du Bonnet Regional Library are encouraging local students to tell their stories in a search for the next great young Canadian writer.

First launched in 2012 by the Ripple Foundation, the purpose of the Kids Write 4 Kids creative writing contest is to empower the next generation of leaders by cultivating a passion for reading and writing in youth while fostering their creativity.

The contest is open to children in Grades 4 to 8 across Canada who submit their literary masterpiece online by March 31, 2022. The winning stories will be published in paperback and eBook editions available for sale. The proceeds of the book sales will be disbursed to charities selected by the winning student writers to foster a sense of philanthropy.

During the program's nine years the Ripple Foundation has published 19 books written by contest winners.

Lauric Kjartanson, public services coordinator at the Lac du Bonnet Library, expects some good submissions.

Stories must be original and written entirely by a single author, and can be fact or fiction, prose or poetry.
